COFFEYVILLE TAKES HOME DI CHAMPIONSHIP

Coffeyville took home the DI Men's Championship hardware this year. Their victory broke their 59 year drought. Coffeyville out of Kansas took on the No. 8 ranked Cowley. The Red Ravens was one of the teams that received an at large bid after finishing the season 27–3.

Coffeyville found the winning formula at the right time, winning five games over the course of six days. Coffeyville dominated the first half of the game heading into the half with a 23 point lead over Cowley.



Cowley did not go down easily. They came out of the locker room going on an offensive run to bring the Coffeyville lead down to three points with just over a minute left to play.

Even with the run, the Red Ravens ramped up their defense and was able to hold off their advances.

Coffeyville was led to the championship by head coach, Jay Herkelman. Herkelman is a NJCAA Men's Basektball Coaches Association Hall of Famer. He was able to lead the team to the school's third title game appearance and second national championship.

DMACC Wins First National Championship



Des Moines Area (IA) defeated Davidson-Davie (NC) in a wild DI Championship game. This was the first tournament title for DMACC and just their sixth appearance in the tournament.

DMACC didn't have an easy road to the title game. The Bears had to face a fellow region 11 team, Iowa Lakes in the semifinals.

Region 11 teams are no stranger to the DII National Championship. DMACC is now the fourth region 11 team to win the past five DII National Championships.

DMACC finished the season 21-5 and their last game did not disappoint. It was a close competition the whole time. DMACC had only a five-point lead at halftime and won by only 11 points.

Their 57.1% field goal shooting helped them secure the win along with their 20-0 scoring run in the second half to pull out ahead in the final minutes.

Head coach Brett Putz was eager to get back to the tournament after his team qualified last year as the No. 2 seed but then was cancelled due to COVID-19.

The offensive battle against Davidson-Davie ended with the Bears finishing what they started last year and taking home the win.

NJCAA ALUMAE COMPETE IN NJCAA TOURNAMENT

Sixty Eight teams compete each year in the NCAA tournament. Each team battling for a spot in the coveted Final Four. In 2021 the NJCAA showed out with 77 former NJCAA student-athletes making an appearance at the NCAA Tournament. These athletes spanned 38 team and faced unique challenges of playing in the tournament during COVID-19.

After being named the 2019 NJCAA DI Men's Basketball Player of the Year, Chris Duarte has transferred to Oregon and has been instrumental in their success. Duarte compete for Northwest Florida State during his time with the NJCAA and helped them reach the No. 1 seed in the NJCAA National Tournament.

During his 2021 season with Oregon he led the Ducks scoring averaging 17.1 PPG and 4.6 rebounds per game. As one of the only two players to average at least 17.0 points and 1.9 steals per game he the Jerry West Award. He was the first Oregon and Pac-12 player to win this award.

After beating VCU and Iowa in the 1st and 2nd rounds, they lost to USC 82-68 in the Sweet 16.

Tomas Woldetensae transferred to Virginia after a fantastic sophomore season with Indian Hills. Woldetensae earned NJCAA First Team All-American honors in 2019 averaging 17.3 PPG and making an appearance in the NJCAA DI Men's Basketball Championship tournament.

After transferring to Virginia, he started 22 games in the 2019–2020 season before it was cancelled due to COVID-19. This season he has seen minutes in 22 games, starting five of those games. Averaging 4.4 PPG and 1.3 RPG, Woldetensae shot 41% from the field and 41.8% from three. The No. 4 seed was upset by No. 13 Ohio in the 1st round of the NCAA tournament. The Cavaliers loosing 62–58.


Another former NJCAA player of note is Rashad Smith. The former Pima Aztec player has helped secure Grand Canyon their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament in school history. Smith led Pima Aztec to the district championship title as well as their first national title appearance since 2019. Grand Canyon faced No. 2 Iowa in the 1st round, loosing 86-74.

2021 ALL-STAR GAME POSTPONED

After a vote by the NJCAA Men's Basketball Coaches Association, the 2021 All-Star Game is postponed until 2022. This vote also postponed the Hall of Fame banquet. Typically, the All-Star Game and Hall of Fame Banquet take place during the NABC Championship Basketball Clinic. The coaching clinic is the largest in the country.

The 2021 clinic has also been canceled. The NJCAA Men's Basketball Coaches Association remains committed to these events. They are predicted to resume in 2022.

Jay Herkelman has been named DI Men's Coach of the Year after leading Coffeyville to a national title this year.

Coffeyville defeated Cowley 108-99 in the national championship game to take home the title. Coffeyville went 14-0 at home this season, held a 13 game winning streak, and were ranked in the top-10 for the entire season.

Herkelman is no stranger to these awards. He won All-Jayhawk East Coach of the Year and Coach of the Tournament this year, was inducted into the NJCAA Men's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame and is the winningest men's basketball coach in Region 6 history.



NJCAA DII Coach of the Year BRETT PUTZ

DMACC Head Coach, Brett Putz, has been named the DII Men's Coach of the Year. The 2021 season was Putz's inaugural season as head coach for DMACC.

Putz led the Bears to a 21-5 season, an ICCAC regular-season championship and the NJCAA DII Men's Basketball Championship national title. Putz also earned the ICCAC Coach fo the Year, led the Bears to their first national title in program history, earned DII Coach of the T

"His leadership of the staff and players, and his development of his team's culture was truly amazing," said DMACC Athletic Director, BJ McGinn.

NJCAA DI MEN'S BASKETBALL PLAYER OF THE YEAR MALEVY LEONS, MINERAL AREA

The DI Men's Basketball Player of the Year is Malevy Leons. Leons, a sophomore forward for Mineral Area, averaged 18.7 points per game this season.

Leons had 10 games in which he scored more than 20 points. Along with his high scoring, he average 9.7 rebounds per game and had six games this season with double doubles.

Leons ranked 25th in the nation for rebounds and 27th nationally for points.

Be awarded DI Men's Basketball Player of the Year is one of the many awards he has earned. He also earned National Association of Basketball Coaches Two-Year Player of the Year, NJCAA First Team All-American Recognition and Region 16 Player of the Year.

Mineral Area went 24-1 this season which included a 20-0 regular season record. Leons helps lead them to a MCCAC Conference Championship, a NJCAA Midwest District title and their most successful season in school history.

Leons has spent time competing internationally as well. Leons played for Netherlands at both the 2018 and 2019 FIBA U20 European Championships.

NJCAA DII MEN'S BASKETBALL PLAYER OF THE YEAR DESHAWNDRE WASHINGTON, SOUTH SUBURBAN

Deshawndre Washington, the sophomore guard for South Suburban, has been named 2021 NJCAA DII Men's Basketball Player of the Year.

Washington averaged 27.0 points per game making him the nations leading scorer. Although Washington was a strong offensive player, he excelled defensively. His 2.7 steals per game landed him fourth in the nation and second for blocks with 2.8 per game.

Washington is a dynamic, two way that finished the season with 22 games with double doubles. He earned NJCAA DII Men's Basketball First Team All-American, National Tournament Tournament team, Region 4 All-Tournament Team, Region 4 tournament MVP.

During the 2021 National Tournament, Washington scored 36 points with 13 rebounds against North Central Missouri. Performances like these earned his All-Tournament team selection.

"I am extremely happy for and proud of Deshawndre. He carried this year's team on his back all season long. That is quite the accomplishment considering the




DONTA SMITH

PLAYER - SOUTHEASTERN (IL)

After having a successful junior college career with Southeastern Illinois, Donta Smith opted to enter the 2004 NBA Draft. Smith had previously committed to University of Louisville.

Taken in the second round by the Atlanta Hawks, Smith played two seasons for the Arkansas RimRockers before continuing his career abroad. Smith continues to play for Venezuela today.



Smith was the last NJCAA basketball member to be selected in the NBA draft, prior to Jay Scrubb being selected in 2020.







Jerry Stone, the former head coach for Midland, was offered a full scholarship to play basketball at McMurry College (TX.) An honor student a McMurry, Stone worked for his basketball coach as a graduate assistant.

Stone holds the school record for most wins in Chaparrals basketball program history. Under his leadership his teams went 279-80 and 138-80 in conference play.



Stone spent a decade coaching Midland. In that time he took Midland to their first NJCAA DI Men's Basketball Championship in 1982.

Stone coached several players that continued onto the NBA including Anthony "Spud" Webb, Daron "Mookie" Blaylock and Ricky Grace.

After Stone concluded his coaching career, he wrote a book, published in 2019, "Save Them All: One Coach's Quest."

Stone's 42 years coaching earned him more than 800 wins.



COACH - NORTH LAKE (TX)

Tim McGraw's coaching has spanned junior high school to the professional level. His various levels of coaching has helped him lead the North Lake College Blazers at such a high level for the past 20 years.

With McGraw's leadership, the Blazers have made six NJCAA DIII Men's Basketball Championship appearances. In that time, they have brought home the national championship title three times (20006, 2008, 2017.) He matched each of those wins with NJCAA DIII Men's Basketball Coach of the Year. Prior to coaching, McGraw played collegiately at John Brown University as well as on four Christian missionary tours.



PETE NORMAN COACH - HIGHLAND (IL)

Before coaching Highland, Pete Norman was a player himself. Norman graduated in 1981. After stepping down from coaching Highland in 2009, he is now the athletic director and golf coach.

Norman valued academics and keeping a high graduation

Over 90% of Norman's players graduated and transferred to other colleges and universities.

Throughout his head coaching career with Highland, Norman acquired a 395-110 record and led teams to five NJCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship appearances from 2004-2009.





Mike Marquis has been leading Tyler's Men's Basketball team for the past 20 years. After graduating from Newton High School, Marquis played collegiately for Marshalltown (IA) and Grand View College (IA.)

Before taking over as head coach for Tyler in 2001, Marquis was head coach at Indian Hills (IA.) During his time with Indian Hills he had a record of 60-10.

The Apache's recently won NJCAA DI Men's Basketball tournament, after winning the NJCAA Region 14 in the 2017-2018 season.
