Hutchinson, KS -

For the fourth time in school history, Vincennes (IN) cut the nets at Hutch. The Trailblazers held off a strong second-half effort by Ranger (TX) to claim the 2019 NJCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship title 87-77; the program's first championship since 1972. Saturday's national title game was televised live on the CBS Sports Network for the first time in NJCAA history.

Dominating the first 20 minutes of play, Vincennes knocked down eight of 10 three-point attempts while connecting on 64.5% of its field goal attempts in the opening frame.

Despite the early deficit, Ranger would not go down without a fight. In the second half, Ranger's efforts to close the gap were led by long-range shooting and defensive rebounding.

A late rally brought the Rangers within five with just 00:30 left to play. The Trailblazers pulled away by going 5-6 at the charity stripe to secure their national title win.

Vincennes' Kevin Osawe was named the William French Most Valuable Player of the Tournament. The freshman forward posted a game-high 22-points in the title win over Ranger, including four of the Trailblazer's 10 total three-pointers.

Todd Franklin, Vincennes' head coach, was named the Coach of the Tournament. Franklin coached the Trailblazers to their first national title in 47 years and ended the season with a 34-2 record. Franklin also eclipsed the 600-win mark for his career after a quarter-final victory.

Vincennes won all four games of the 2019 tournament by an average of 11.6 PPG. The Trailblazers' highest-scoring offensive output came in the title game with the team's 87-point effort. As a team, Vincennes tallied 32 three-point shots in the tournament.

On the path to the national title game, the third-seeded Trailblazers downed No. 14 Moberly Area, No. 6 Odessa, and second-seeded and defending national champions, South Plains (TX).

Sophomore guard Keith Clemons averaged a respectable 14.3 PPG and led all players throughout the tournament with 21 assists to land a spot on the All-Tournament Team.

The title marks the fourth in team history for a program that claims the most appearances at the historic men's basketball national tournament in Hutchinson. The Trailblazers improve to 66-50 all-time at the tournament, tied for the most wins with Moberly Area (MO). The four national titles are tied for the most all-time for one program with Moberly Area and San Jacinto-Central (TX).

KIRKWOOD

31-4 FINAL RECORD







Danville, IL -

Everyone knew it would be a battle coming into the national title game at the NJCAA Division II Men's Basketball Championship. For the second straight year, it was a clash between the top two seeds: No. 1 Kirkwood and No. 2 Johnson County.

Kirkwood and Johnson County traded early blows, swapping the lead multiple times as the early going saw Johnson County extend a 17-12 advantage. However, the immediate side of halftime belonged to Kirkwood as the Eagles went on a 21-9 run to close out the first half and take a seven-point advantage into the locker room. The Eagles came out even more hot to start the second half. A 10-2 start prompted a Johnson County timeout.

The Cavaliers would get the deficit down to 10 points shortly before a shot clock-beating three-pointer from Doug Wilson contributed to his game-high 30 points and helped the Eagles go on another quick 7-0 run to push the game back to a 50-35 scoreline.

It is the third men's basketball national title in Kirkwood's program history. The other titles came in 1998 and 2016. Coach of the Tournament, Bryan Petersen was also at the helm of the 2016 championship team and now is a perfect 8-0 in Danville in two appearances.

Coming into the championship game, Kirkwood had won nine straight games by 10-plus points. In the tournament, the Eagles took down North Central Missouri (96-66), Niagara County (80-65), and No. 11 Erie (84-70) before the 64-58 win over Johnson County for the title. The Eagles finished the year with a 31-4 record. It was the third time in the last four years that a Region XI team has taken home the championship trophy. In addition to Kirkwood's 2016 title, Southwestern also won the tournament in 2017.

Doug Wilson was a scoring machine for the Eagles all season. Wilson finished with a 30-point output in the finale to add to his three other double-figures performances this tournament. That's a grand total of 92 points during the final week of play for the South Dakota State signee.

HERKIMER

31-1 FINAL RECORD





Rochester, MN -

No. 2 Seed Herkimer (NY) won their first National Championship since 1991 with a 72-60 Victory over No. 5 Rock Valley in the Division III tournament final. The Generals finished with a near perfect 31-1 overall record and ended with a 28 game win streak.

Head Coach Matt Lee was named Coach of the Tournament after leading Herkimer to their first National Title in 28 years. Sophomore guard Derrick Felder was named tournament MVP and averaged 18 PPG in three games at this year's tournament. Felder dropped 23 points, had seven rebounds, three assists, and three steals in the tournament final.

Trailing at halftime, the Generals used a 17-0 run in the second half to take home the 2019 NJCAA DIII Men's Basketball Championship. Trailing by as many as 10-points in the first half, Herkimer picked up some momentum before halftime when a late 3-point shot decreased the deficit to six. With several lead-switches in the second half, the Generals trailed once again with just under five minutes left in the game. Herkimer went on a late run, posting 17 unanswered points to claim the lead. Tournament MVP, Derrick Felder scored nine of his game-high 23 points during the surge.

Herkimer defeated Sandhills 76-64 in the quarter-final round. In the semi-final round, the Generals downed third-seeded Richland to advance to the national title game. Herkimer finished the season on a 28-game win streak and an overall record of 31-1. Fifth-seeded Rock Valley pulled off an upset in Thursday's quarter-final round, defeating No. 4 Bunker Hill 64-56. The Golden Eagles faced Central Lakes in the semi-final round. Trailing the Raiders by 12-points in the second half, Rock Valley pulled off an impressive comeback to secure their spot in the championship game.





CHRIS DUARTE NORTHWEST FLORIDA STATE

Leading the Raiders to their fifth consecutive FCSAA Panhandle Conference championship, Duarte powered Northwest Florida State to 28-5 record on the year. In a season where the sophomore guard eclipsed the career 1000-point threshold, Duarte guided the Raiders to the quarterfinal round of the NJCAA DI Men's Basketball Championship for the second consecutive year. Throughout his 2018-19 campaign, Duarte posted 10 doubledoubles and was held to single-digits in the scoring column on just two occasions.

DOUG WILSON KIRKWOOD

Leading Kirkwood to its third national title in program history, the Eagles' big man cemented his spot as the top player with a 30-point, 15-rebound performance in the national championship game. Doug Wilson finished in double-figure scoring in all but two of the Eagles' 34 games this season.

Wilson's next stop will take him to South Dakota State in Brookings, SD. The Jackrabbits have been to the NCAA DI Men's Basketball Championship tournament five times since 2012

The Eagles then cruised through their first three games of the national tournament, winning them by an average of 19.7 points per game. That led to a clash of the top two seeded teams for the national championship, where Kirkwood held off a late Johnson County rally, 64-58.
